Kari Norgaard is Associate Professor of Sociology and Environmental Studies at University of Oregon. Over the past ten years she has published and taught in the areas of environmental sociology, gender and environment, race and environment, climate change, sociology of culture, social movements and sociology of emotions. She currently has two active areas of research: work on the social organization of denial (especially regarding climate change), and environmental justice work with Native American Tribes on the Klamath River. Both of these areas of scholarship have been nationally recognized through the award of research grants, speaking invitations, and coverage of research by high profile media outlets including the Washington Post, National Geographic, British Broadcasting System, and National Public Radio. More broadly, she is interested in tribal environmental health, race and environment, gender and environment, climate change denial, emotions and social movements. Her book, *Living in Denial: Climate Change, Emotions and Everyday Life*, was published by MIT Press in Spring 2011.
