GREAT LAKES AND MARINE POLICY AND SCIENCE

The fellowships offer terrific career-building and networking opportunities, real-world training, salary and benefits, and a chance to explore careers where science and policy meet.

Graduate students with a wide range of backgrounds (i.e., science, policy, law) and a strong interest in Great Lakes, coastal, or marine issues are encouraged to apply. Programs require a full-time commitment and most, but not all, fellows participate after graduating.

KNAUSS MARINE POLICY

The Knauss Fellowship program matches graduate students with "hosts" such as congressional offices, the National Marine Fisheries Service, or the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Fellows work on a range of policy and management projects related to ocean, coastal, and Great Lakes resources.
