

Job Title: District Wildlife Biologist, GS-0486-9/11 Huron-Manistee National Forests — Manistee, Michigan



The **Huron-Manistee National Forests** are seeking candidates to fill a permanent full-time GS-0486-9/11 **District Wildlife Biologist** position on the Manistee National Forest with a duty station in Manistee, Michigan. The Huron-Manistee National Forests seeks **interested candidates** who are eligible for GS-0486-9/11 (http://www.opm.gov/qualifications). This position is located in the Natural Resources Staff; the District Wildlife Biologist reports to the District Ranger.

The District Wildlife Biologist is responsible for the wildlife program, which includes endangered, threatened and rare species conservation, habitat restoration, and partnerships.

Duties include:

District wildlife program manager, provides overall leadership, coordination, planning, and implementation of the wildlife program across 250,000 acres. Provides programmatic direction for all wildlife and ETS resource activities on the Cadillac-Manistee District.

Monitor and protect federally endangered piping plover, federally designated critical habitat, and federally threatened pitcher's thistle at Nordhouse Dunes Wilderness Area, along 7 miles of pristine Lake Michigan shoreline. Provide for conservation and monitoring of federally endangered Indiana bat and federally threatened northern long-eared bat along riverine systems and northern hardwood habitat.

Plan and implement wildlife management plans, priorities include conservation for federally threatened eastern massasauga rattlesnake, eastern box turtle, and wild turkey in coordination with restoration of pine barren ecosystems, aspen management and opening maintenance.

Interdisciplinary team member on District NEPA projects providing input and analysis for all wildlife related issues and concerns. Recommend preventative or mitigative actions. Prepares environmental analysis reports for wildlife resources. Develops biological evaluations for endangered, threatened, and sensitive species and facilitates consultation with Fish and Wildlife Service.

Serve lead role in facilitating habitat enhancement for American marten. Coordinate monitoring and research partnerships with the Tribes (Little River Band Ottawa Indians) and university researchers (Grand Valley State University, University of Michigan, Flint).

Coordinate partnerships with State, Tribal, and Federal wildlife resource agencies. Oversee challenge cost share agreements, write proposals for grants and leverage funding for projects. Develop and oversee contracts for implementation of projects. Awarded grants include pine barren restoration, native seed and pollinator habitat, grouse and woodcock habitat enhancement, and opening maintenance.

Perform supervisory duties at least 25% of the time. This position supervises at least one full-time wildlife technician and summer seasonals and interns. Hire temporaries, establish and communicate guidelines and performance requirements to employees; conduct formal performance reviews; and identify and provide for the developmental and training needs of employees.

About Manistee, Michigan:

Manistee is a full service community of approximately 6,200 people, situated in the northwest portion of the Lower Peninsula of Michigan on the shores of Lake Michigan. There generally is a good selection of housing in the \$70,000 to \$150,000 price range however, rentals are limited and range from \$500 to \$1,500 per month. The area abounds with four season outdoor recreation opportunities. Manistee boasts a re-vitalized downtown with a beautiful river-walk adjacent to a variety of retail shops and restaurants. Wild and scenic rivers provide world class trout fishing and Lake Michigan offers salmon and steelhead fishing.
